

Much like youth camp, this camp will be geared towards women who are new, have little to no experience, or are seeking more knowledge on hunting. Topics and sessions will range from gun safety and handling, shooting, mock hunting, safety and survival, and so much more!

January 1984 - Northeast Chapter Meeting Notes

Motion moved by Steve Babine for the President to contact National as the proper procedures for communication and membership.

Motion seconded and approved.

It was noted that the Secretary will now recieve all membership applications and will forward all monies to the Treasurer.

Blaine Carter reported that the chapter had made no recommendations to National concerning apprentice judges. He stated that he had sent all the perinent information directly to Bodo for his consideration.

The Director of Field Testing stated that he had set up dates and locations for 1984. They were to be May 26,27,28 in Simsbury, Conn. and Sept. 8,9 in Valley Falls, New York.

Discussion of changing the tests location.

Motion moved by Patti Carter that the Maine and New Hampshire people of the Northeast chapter organize and put on a test in Bowdoinham Maine on Memorial Day weekend or the weekend after. Motion withdrawn.

Discussion of a letter written and distributed by the Maine and New Hampshire Committee signed by the Chairperson Patti Carter. This letter states that a vote had been taken and approved to establish a Maine and New Hampshire Chapter effective January 1985.

Discussion of this letter with no action being taken.

Motion moved by Steve Babine that we accept the tests dates as given by the Director of Testing. Motion is seconded. No vote was taken.

The Secretary then read from the chapter constitutuin the position of Director of Field Testing. Note "The Directore of Field Testing in consultation with the Executive Council is responsible for assuring that local areas properly co-ordinate and conduct the Chapter test including proper and timely disemination of test information both before and after the test."

President Paul Jensen called an Executive Council meeting to dicuss the issue of tests dates for 1984 to take place at that time.

President paul Jensen gave the decision of the Executive Council.

The Spring test will be held on Memorial Day weekend., Saturday in connecticut on Monday in Maine. The same judge will be transported to the test sights. The fall test will be in New York.

The Director of Testing stated that he was not in favor of this decision.

Discussion of Training Clinic dates. Note: a separate schedule accompanies these minutes.

The Director of Training Steve Babine stated that he does not agree with the training clinic schedule because of the distances to be covered.

Motion moved by Steve Babine that the Maine Committee be disolved given a reasonable period of time to do so. Motion is seconded and approved.

Motion moved by Steve Baine that the Income Expense sheet be ammended to include other items pertinent to training clinics and that it be required that such sheets be present at all clinics. Motion is seconded and approved.

Motion moved by Steve Babine to amend a previous motion to set a date for the dissolving of the Maine Committee.

Note a date was set for Januray 31, 1984. Motion is seconded and approved.

Discussion on who was going to run the various training clincs. Note: Terry Weaver will handle those in Conn. and Blaine Carter those in Maine.



What I do once the snow flies and temps drop!

Holiday greeting to all our Yankee Chapter friends! Blaine, Yankee's Director of Training, has a new hip, doing well and will be back in action this spring. In the meantime, he let me share a few of my puppy drills. -- Patti

Controlling a pup's emotions at a young age.

I love puppy training and helping you avoid issues down the road. We currently have lots of puppies in our chapter that will be teenagers by spring. There's no better time than a cold winter day to work on obedience that you will need come spring training.

Waiting for a meal is where I introduce emotional control and the word "whoa." I always start by hand feeding. I put a few kibbles in my hand and place hand on the floor in front of pup. "Whoa"! It's very simple; if pup moves for food, my hand is closed and the food denied. Repeat, repeat.... Eventually pup will figure out how to get dinner. The key is that the pup figured it out! Patience is required.

We had a chapter friend stop by recently and share some great hunting stories. He also shared what a difficult time he had putting his dog's hunting vest on. Pup wiggled and squirmed to the point our friend gave up!

It's VERY important to develop a trusting relationship during these early drills, while still maintaining your leadership role. Patience is required!

My suggestion to him and all of you is to plan ahead. With the vest, I would shape the behavior of waiting quietly. Even a pup can be taught to control emotions. Of course, you all know I am hugely in favor of using treats to shape a particular behavior. Start by teaching patience on the place board. Once wait is understood, place vest on back, treat. Repeat. Place the vest's strap around pup's neck, treat. Repeat. You will notice it's now all about food, and not about the vest. Patience is required. Try to do this with all drills.

Winter drills for the older dog.

I'm sure you all had moments during your fall hunts that as Blaine says, "the wheels started falling off or just plain derailed!"

Here are a few drills Blaine recommends:

1. Wait patiently at door before being let out.

2. Wait patiently before exiting crate or car.

3. Wait patiently while putting dog bowl onto the floor.

4. Staircase heeling, up and down. Try backing up!

5. Off lead heeling in basement using objects to walk around.

6. Push pull exercises.

7. Line drills in the snow, blinds and marks.

8. Correct delivery positions with eye contact!

We hope this will help you better prepare for spring and all our events. Please feel free to call us anytime. Blaine will NOT be dogsledding behind Keepah this winter, maybe Fergi though... See you all soon!

NAVHDA International Annual Meeting - January 30 - February 1, 2025

The 2025 Annual Meeting of the North American Versatile Hunting Dog Association will be hosted by the Montana Sharptail Chapter in Bozeman, Montana. This year, five motions have been proposed that will be discussed and voted on by the delegates. In summary, here are the motions to be considered at the Annual Meeting.

MOTIONS

Canadian Region's Presidents -- Motion that a travel distance be added to the Out of Area judge definition. Judges would either have to be residing two (Western US/Canada) or three (Eastern US) states or provinces over or have a travel minimum of a specific distance.

Canadian -- Motion for NAVHDA to survey chapters to identify and compile best practices for retaining more members past the Natural Ability stage.

KS NAVHDA -- Motion to add a registered name check to the website to see if a prospective puppy's registered name will meet NAVHDA requirements.

Pocono Mountain -- Motion to have the Annual Meeting Delegates Meeting and Saturday morning Executive meeting available online to all chapters.

Michigan Chapter -- Motion that the Executive Council would consider someone who has been a member of NAVHDA for 30 consecutive years in good standing be granted a life membership.

What's an Aims & Rules Clinic?

The Yankee Chapter will be hosting a NAVHDA Aims & Rules Clinic this spring. It's a wonderful opportunity to take a deep dive into the goals, scoring, and judging of NAVHDA tests. Here's the summary presented on the NAVHDA International website:

"The Aims & Rules Clinic is an educational tool developed by NAVHDA to help dog owners and handlers understand the testing system. The clinics are conducted by designated NAVHDA Senior Judges and Clinic Leaders. Aims & Rules Clinics cover a variety of topics over two days, including informal classroom style instruction on the NAVHDA philosophy, test mechanics, and the scoring system for each test.

Participants will also take to the field and water to judge and score dogs being run in a mock test setting. After each section the participants and the Clinic Leader will discuss the dog's performance, where the performance would fall in the NAVHDA scoring system, and any strengths of weaknesses in training and handling.

Many clinic leaders also include helpful tips and suggestions on handling dogs in NAVHDA tests.



Who Should Attend and Why?

• People with their first dog will see how other dogs work and gain insight into what their dog is doing and why. This will help to develop their pup's talents and improve performance.

• Novice handlers will learn how NAVHDA evaluates versatile dogs, and thus will be better prepared to handle their dogs in a test.

• Experienced handlers will gain a deeper, more technical knowledge of how the team of dog and handler are judged.

• Breeders will learn what to look for in their breeding stock and their progeny, and how to use NAVHDA records obtained through our Search Test Records service for selective breeding.

• Aspiring NAVHDA Judges are required to attend an Aims & Rules Clinic and is one of the first steps in our Apprentice Judge Program."

More information about dates, times, locations and sign-up will be available in the next month or so.

According to Gabby Zaldumbide, Editor in Chief of Project Upland, the top five hunting breeds are the German shorthair /DK, Labrador retriever, English setter, Brittany, and German wirehair/DD.

The annual Project Upland survey also showed the least common (least owned) breeds: Picardy spaniel, Wirehaired vizsla, Braque d'Auvergne, Braque du Bourbonnais, and Blue Picardy spaniel.


Phippsburg Winter Kids Day


LIFE TIME HUNTING & FISHING LICENSES



Update on the CDC Dog Import Rulings

In August, the Sportsmen's Alliance filed a lawsuit against the Centers for Disease C ontrol and Prevention on behalf of NAVHDA and several other groups. The SA case focuses on the CDC's acting in excess of its statutory authority when it issued new regulations requiring extensive paperwork, microchipping, and a minimum age of 6 months for all dogs entering the U.S. Subsequently,the CDC reduced the amount of required paperwork but has stood behind the rest of the new rulings.

The SA also filed a motion for preliminary injunction, seeking to have the CDC remove the new rulings until the court case is heard. The CDC filed an opposition to that injunction a month later.

On December 19, the Sportsmen's Alliance Foundation presented oral arguments to the United States District Court for the Western District of Michigan supporting their request for an injunction on the restrictions. If the injunction is approved, that means the new regulations will be suspended -- with the old regs back in place -- until the lawsuit itself is heard in court.

The judge's ruling on that injunction is expected in January. Despite the CDC claiming they might revisit the rulings, they have offered no details and no timeline for doing so. It may take many months for the SA case to be heard, and the CDC's revisiting may never happen or may not change the regulations. Thus the injunction is extremely important to breeders, hunters, travelers, dog owners attending trials and shows out of the country, and dog owners who seek veterinary care abroad as well.

Venison Tenderloin with Mustard Sauce by Nick Racioppi

Tenderloin:

- Marinate the tenderloin in a mixture of kosher salt, ginger, olive oil, and soy sauce for a few hours.
- Grill the loins on high until seared on all sides. Lower heat and cook until desired temp.
- Once cooked, remove from heat and let stand for 15 minutes before slicing.
- Slice into 1" thick pieces and cut pieces in half.
- Serve with the mustard sauce for an excellent appetizer.

Mustard Sauce:

- 1 cup mayo
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3 tsp. white vinegar
- 3 tbl. Dry mustard
- 3 tbl. Scallions

Make a paste out of the vinegar and mustard. Add the rest of the ingredients. Place in refrigerator and chill overnight.

What is the HIP Program?

The Harvest Information Program is managed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) and state fish and wildlife agencies. Woodcock and other migratory bird hunters are must get HIP certification by answering a few questions about past harvest patterns. HIP certification is typically obtained when purchasing an annual hunting license, but even hunters with a lifetime license are required to complete the certification.

The information collected through HIP certification is later used

to create a sampling framework for the USFWS Migratory Bird Harvest Survey (diary survey) and Parts Collection Survey (wing survey). These surveys, along with band recoveries and population studies, give biologists the data they need to make informed decisions on hunting regulations and migratory bird management.

HIP certification is not only a legal requirement for woodcock hunters but also a critical component of migratory bird management. Data collected through HIP help biologists estimate migratory bird populations and assess the impact of hunting.

Accurate harvest estimates are vital for:

• Ensuring the health and sustainability of woodcock and other migratory bird populations

- Setting appropriate hunting regulations
- Maintaining future hunting opportunities



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
